- the same day, later in the evening after the hanging


Overview Continued

- Monsieur and Madame talk about revenge with the revolution
- Monsieur worries that the revolution will not happen in his life
- Madame admits that knitting is a hobby to keep busy

Literary Devices

Motif- a dominant idea in a literary composition

2 major examples of Motifs in the chapter:

- Knitting
- The Revolution

Knitting



 "So much was closing in about the women who sat knitting, knitting, that they their very selves were closing in around a structure yet unbuilt, where they were to sit knitting, knitting, counting dropping heads." (194)

Knitting Continued

- as the women knit they were actually putting people's names into the "register"
- the motif of knitting is repeated throughout the book, but it is only now that we have figured out the symbolism

Knitting Continued

- the knitting is actually symbolism for the three fates in Greek Mythology
- Madame Defarge is creating a list
- puts the names of people she wants killed when the revolution starts

Three Fates



Revolution

- Defarge is worried that the revolution will not come in his lifetime, but Madame Defarge tells him to be patient, and they will get "revenge"
- "But when it is ready, it takes place, and grinds to pieces everything before it." (208)

Revolution Continued

- The revolution is a repeating motif
- referred to in different ways
- in this way seen as lightning and an earthquake
- It is an earthquake because it is a perpetual thing, building up over time until it finally cracks and revolution breaks out
